



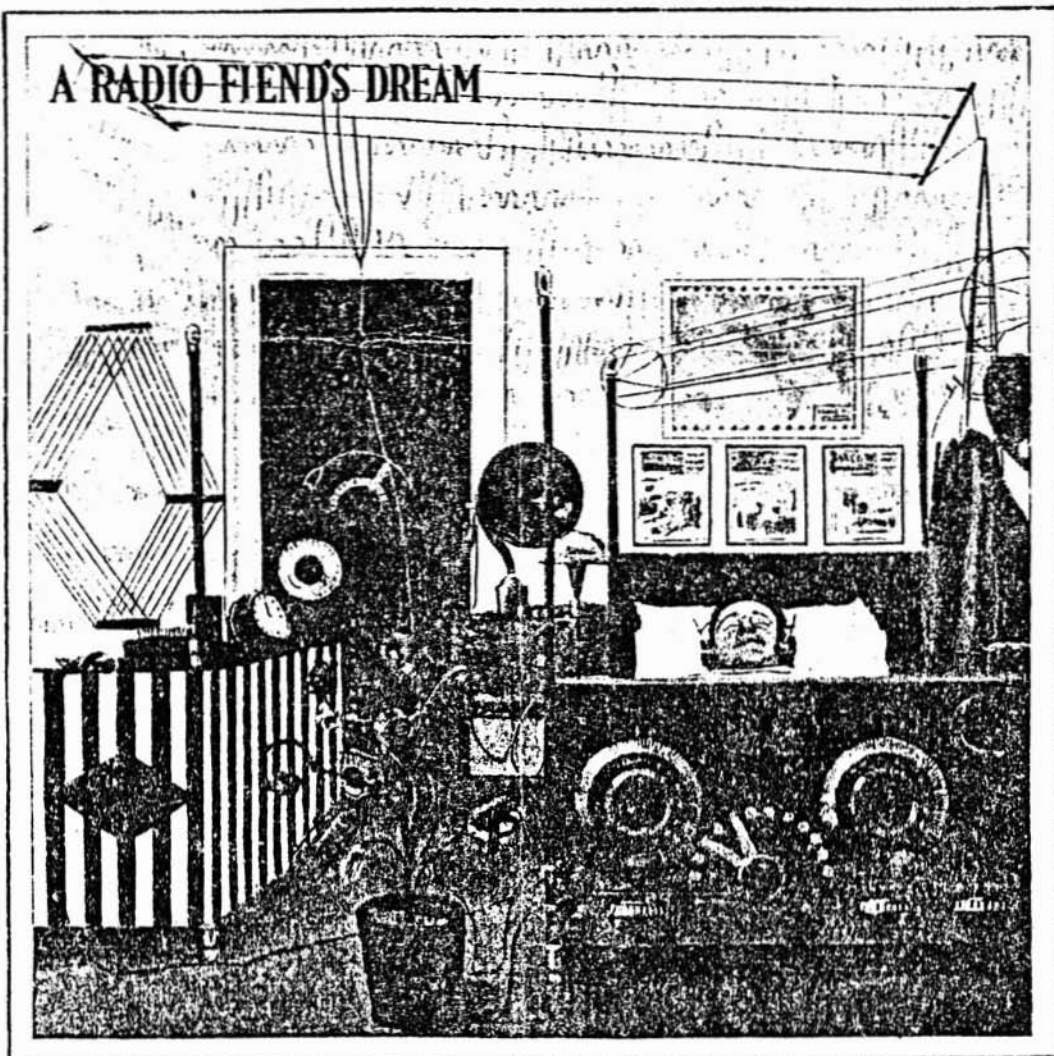

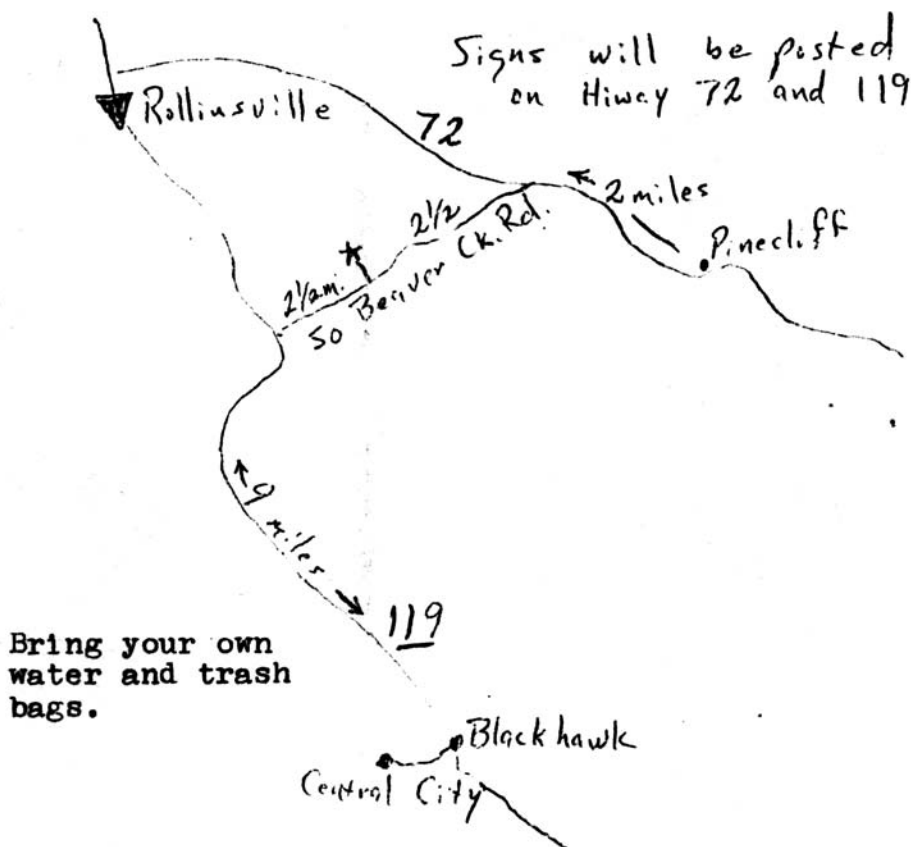

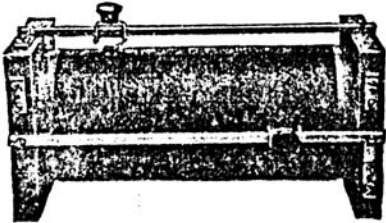
Events

Willa Mae Brooks found a Tyrman model 50 portable battery set at the flea market on the same day as the acquisition of the AK Breadboard.

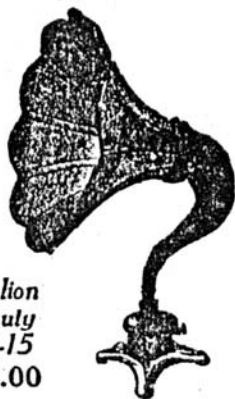
George Page bought a box of Western Electric baseball V.T.'s at the Bonanza flea market for a good price.

Speaking of Tubes...

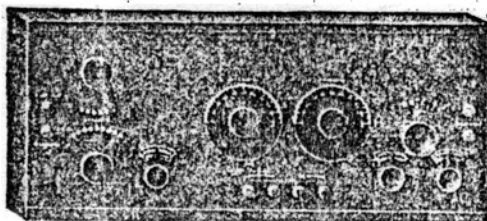
