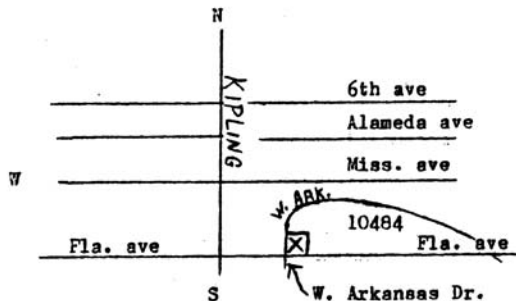

Continuing with the history of radio in Boulder, the following information on the career of Mr Hurlburt "Andy" Anderson, a Boulder radio pioneer, was taken from newspaper clippings from the Boulder Daily Camera.

FROM BOULDER, CO. DAILY CAMERA

The U.S. Navy was the branch of service selected by Mr Anderson and he became chief radio electrician. He received training in the Brooklyn Navy Yard until June 1917 when he sailed for France landing at Brest.

Because of illness he was sent to Hospital Base No. 5, Brest, France, and returned to the U.S. in October 1918. Before he became ill he was engaged in convoy duty, and later with the radio shore station at Brest, France. He writes: "We were doing convoy duty between the English channel at England, down the coast of France to ports known as Lorient and Quiberon and back to Brest, France."

"The only time we had an engagement with a submarine was about 11 a.m. on August 27, 1917. We fired at it a great many times but were unsuccessful in hitting it. In 1918, I was transferred ashore at Brest, France and opened a radio station, which later was the only all-American operated radio station in France up to that time. I left in 1918."

HURLBURT ANDERSON, RADIO INSTRUCTOR FOR NAVY UNIT

Hurlburt Anderson, proprietor of the radio shop at 1618 Pearl has discontinued commercial business to become an instructor in radio in the new navy unit to open at the University (CU) in the near future.

Mr Anderson is an authority on radio and well qualified for a position of instructor. He was in radio work in the first World war and has been in it ever since.

(At this point in this newspaper clipping it goes on to relate some of the same material as above, about Mr Anderson serving in France etc.) It continues... He became ill in the service and after the Armistice was in the hospital at Fort Lyon. He came to Boulder in 1924. Mr Anderson is prominent in the American Legion and Mrs Anderson is president of the Colorado Department of the Auxillary. (3.23.42)

HURLBURT ANDERSON ENGINEER AT GIANT NEW NBC STATION

Mr and Mrs Hurlburt Anderson will leave Monday by automobile to make their home at Davis, Ca., which is 18 miles from Dixon where Mr Anderson is an engineer for a new million dollar radio station built by National Broadcasting Company for the Office of War information. Mr Anderson arrived Friday from Dixon to help Mrs Anderson prepare for the moving.

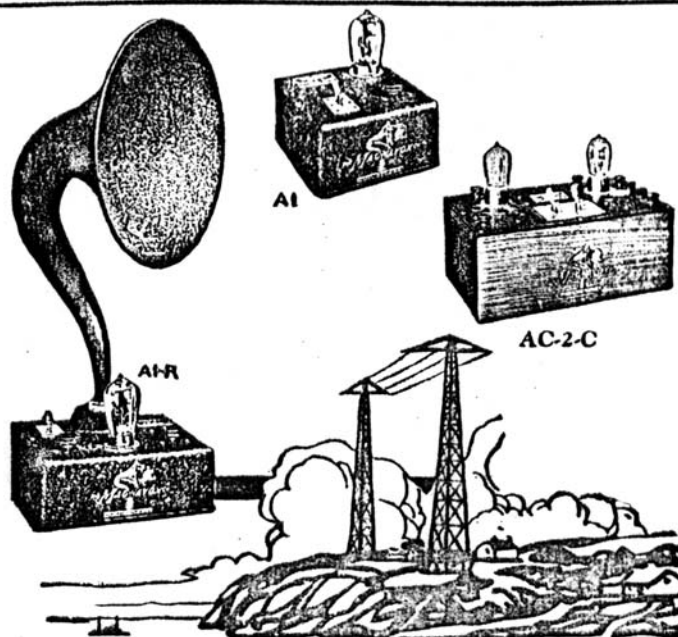
The new station is used by the Office of War information to conduct a psychological warfare against the Japs, also to provide information and entertainment to American soldiers throughout the world. It is beamed at times to assist the office of the coordinator of inter-American affairs in problems intended for south and central American hearing.

A newspaper story from Dixon says: "The giant radio transmitters are causing the Tokyo secret police to do a lot of scurrying these days in an effort to control the tough warfare pouring into the receiving sets of the Japanese average family.

The source of this dangerous material, which Jap authorities fear and dislike so much that they are attempting to jam it off the airways is the San Francisco office of the O.W.I."

The story states that 115 shows a day in English, Japanese, Anamese, Thai, Burmese, Malay, Cantonese, Dutch, and Mandarin Chinese are broadcast. The broadcasts go to Honolulu, to Saipan and are rebroadcast into the territories desired for the best effect. The broadcasts intended to confound the Japs, also include programs designed to build good will and to hold listeners. The building and equipment cost nearly one million dollars. (3.17.45)

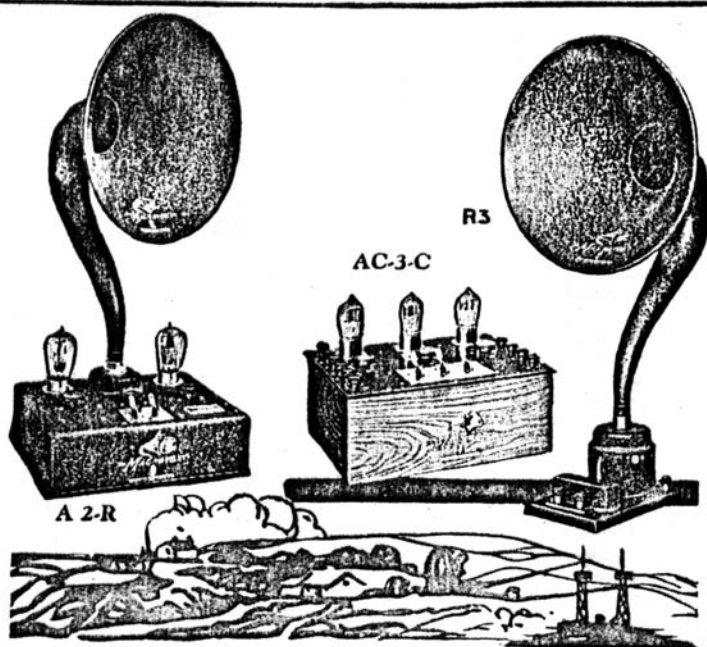

having applied therefor, is hereby granted by the Secretary of Commerce, for a period of two years, on and subject to the restrictions and conditions hereinafter stated and revocable for cause by him, this License to use or operate the apparatus for radio communication (identified in the Schedule hereinafter) for the purpose of transmitting private radiograms or signals, notwithstanding the effect thereof extends beyond the jurisdiction of the State or Territory in which the said station is located: *Provided*, That no interference other than may result under the restrictions contained in this License shall be caused with the radio communication of stations of the Government of the United States or licensed stations.

2. The use or operation of apparatus for radio communication pursuant to this License shall be subject also to the articles and regulations established by the International Radiotelegraphic Convention, ratified by the Senate of the United States and caused to be made public by the President, and shall be subject also to such regulations as may be established from time to time by authority of subsequent acts and treaties of the United States.

3. The apparatus shall at all times while in use and operation be in charge of a person or persons licensed for that purpose by the Secretary of Commerce, and the operator of the apparatus shall not wilfully or maliciously interfere with any other radio communication.

4. The station shall give absolute priority to signals or radiograms relating to ships in distress; shall cease all sending on hearing a distress signal; and shall refrain from sending until all the signals and radiograms relating thereto are completed.

5. The station shall use the minimum amount of energy necessary to carry out any communication desired, and the transformer input shall not exceed ^{one}~~one-half~~ kilowatt.

6. The station shall not use a transmitting wave length exceeding 200 meters.

7. The station shall not use a transmitter during the first 15 minutes of each hour, local standard time, whenever the Secretary of Commerce by notice in writing shall require it to observe a division of the time, pursuant to the Twelfth Regulation of the act of August 13, 1912.

8. The President of the United States in time of war or public peril or disaster is authorized by law to close the station and cause the removal therefrom of all radio apparatus, or may authorize the use or control of the station or apparatus by any department of the Government upon just compensation to the owners.

9. The Secretary of Commerce and Collectors of Customs or other officers of the Government authorized by him may at all reasonable times enter upon the station for the purpose of inspecting and may inspect any apparatus for radio communication of such station and the operation and operators of such apparatus.

10. The apparatus shall not be altered or modified in respect of any of the particulars mentioned in the following Schedule except with the approval of a radio inspector, or other duly authorized officer of the Government. This station not licensed to broadcast weather reports, market reports, news, speeches, music, concerts or similar entertainments or information.

HURLBURT ANDERSON REOPENS ANDY'S
RADIO REPAIR SHOP HERE

Hurlburt "Andy" Anderson, who with Mrs Anderson returned to Boulder a month ago from Davis Ca., has opened Andy's Radio Repair Shop in his residence at 1822 19th after being unable to secure another location. He was in the radio business in Boulder many years prior to the opening of the Navy radio school at the University, when he joined it as a staff member. (1947)

Hurlburt Anderson Sr. Died Saturday

Was Well-Known
Boulder Radio Man,
Member Of Legion

A widely known Boulder radio man and leader in the American Legion — Hurlburt Anderson Sr., — of 1822 Nineteenth street died at the Community Hospital Saturday afternoon. He had been in ill health for many years and was removed to the hospital by ambulance last Wednesday night when his condition suddenly became very serious.

Mr. Anderson was born June 18, 1894 in Bridgeport, Conn., to Carl A. and Harriet Anderson. He was one of the first of the amateur radio operators, starting in Bridgeport at the age of 17. He enlisted in the Navy at New Haven, Conn., May 11, 1917, received basic training at the U.S. Navy Yard in Brooklyn, and because of his fine training in radio left a month later for Brest, France, where he was assigned to the shore station as chief radio electrician. There he became ill. After treatment in Hospital No. 5 at Brest he was sent to Fort Lyon Naval hospital in Colorado Oct., 1918 and became a charter member of the Hospital's American Legion Post.

Upon his discharge from Fort Lyon he came to Boulder to attend the University and engage in the radio business — both in sales and services. In World War II he became an instructor in radio in the Navy unit at the University. In January, 1945, he became engineer with radio station KOY in Phoenix then in March of the same year went to Dixon, Calif., as an engineer for a new million dollar radio station built by the National Broadcasting Co. for the Office of War Information.

After two years at Dixon Mr. Anderson returned to Boulder and reopened his radio shop which he operated until illness forced his retirement.

Mr. Anderson was very active in the American Legion and his wife in the Auxiliary, the latter being a past department president. He was also a member of Columbia Lodge No. 14 A.F. and A.M., and of the First Methodist church.

Wife, Son And Granddaughter Survive

Survivors are his wife, the former Agnes Marshall, who he married in Boulder June 8, 1922 and who is employed in the business office of the University; a son, Hurlburt Anderson Jr., associated with an architecture firm at Fort Collins, and a granddaughter, Diane. Other survivors are a brother, George F. Anderson, residing in Delray Beach, Florida, and a sister, Mrs. John Helmerich, Bridgeport, Conn.

Private services are to be held from the chapel of Howe Mortuary Wednesday morning at 11. Rev. Marvin H. Adams, pastor of the First Methodist church, will officiate. Interment will be in Mountain View Memorial Park, with Columbia Lodge in charge. The body will lie in state at Howe Mortuary Tuesday evening from 6 to 8.
