

FEETHUASUR VIDY

A survey prepared by this Editor asking auestions about the interest and future of the club newsletter, the FLASHII, was passed out to attending members during the last CRC meeting in Denver. More than twenty were returned. Without reprinting the entire survey, text below attempts to reproduce the demeanor of the questionaire. - Editor --

Question One listed the regular features (as shown in "FLASH FEATURES" on page five) asking if they should be retained and with few exceptions all members responded that they wanted these to continue.

Question Two related to possible features to be implemented in future issues as regular features. Most suggestions were overwhelming

accepted. They are listed here:

Specific member interests listed by category (Allows you to find others with similar interests)

Those which received at least a few negative votes were:

> Historical articles about regional radio/TV companies

Historical articles about regional broadcasting and radio stations

Articles about various radio circuits Articles about shortwave radios and collecting them

Articles about early TV and collecting them

Information about meetings of other regional radio collector

It must be mentioned that those that got at least some negatives were in the minority and the majority wanted to see these areas covered at least occasionally.

Question Three asked if we should allow NON-MEMBERS to advertise "Want Ads" without charge and if no, why not? It was clearly the majority who said "No, let them join the club.

It's a priviledge."

Question Four wondered if you should, as a club member, be responsible at least once a year for an article, reprint of documentation, or a picture of your favorite radio (with information about it) to be included in our newsletter? A contribution was considered appropriate by most answering the survey.

Question Five asked the value of the newsletter if paper and postage increases hit us. Nearly all would consider the newsletter a value if club

dues were set at \$15 annually.

Question Six was an open one looking for changes members would make to the newsletter? Nearly all had no comment and three others suggested "Staples" in the spine (like last issue!), "More diverse articles", and "More pictures".

Question Seven asked how we could solicit more "For Sale/Wanted" ads from our members to which there were

no suggestions.


DIAL CORD



TESTS ON BATTERIES from a portable receiver should always be made with a voltmeter-it. is the only testing instrument that will show accurately the effective voltage of a battery. It is risky business to use any other device, including a flashlight bulb or an ammeter. since many of them are likely to affect the life of a battery materially. An ammeter -especially bad to use for this purposehas a low resistance and will short a battery when placed across it. Invariably it will also give a high reading even when a battery is badly run down.

STRIPS CONNECTING THE LOOP ANTENNA inside the cover of some midget portable receivers are likely to wear and break off near the hinge as a result of frequent opening and closing of the lid. When such a break occurs, reception stops. These metal strips can be repaired, however, with short lengths of twisted metal cord like that used in repairing


radio dials. Remove the broken part of the original metal strips at their connection with the two wires inside the set: then solder one end of the cord to each of these wires, and solder the other end to that portion of the strips connected to the antenna.



Where a loop-antenna connection is likely to break, Repair it as shown at the left

BATTERIES THAT DO NOT FIT TIGHTLY in their compartment will not knock about if wrapped in corrugated cardboard. A round hole cut in one piece of the material will permit insertion of the battery plug. To conserve your battery, turn off the receiver when it is not in actual use. If you have a three-way set, use electric current when possible. Batteries kept outside the case at 60-deg. temperature may last 18 months.

THREE SEPARATE PLUGS can be substituted for a single battery-pack plug, as shown in the drawing below, to permit use of separate "A" and "B" batteries with a portable if a battery pack cannot be obtained. In removing any plug from a battery, always grasp the plug itself. Never tug on the wire, for this may pull the insulation back, and a short caused by wires touching can render a battery useless in 15 minutes.

The release of Cohen appeared beneficial due to his egotistical style and self-serving manner of writing articles which were not in the interest of other radio collectors. After many years as Editor of the Antique Wireless Association Bulletin, Lud Sibley has resigned his position, apparently associated with the Cohen firing. Wooters felt this was a sad footnote to the whole affair.

DUES HAVE MATURED!



SIMPLE LAMP-BULB RESISTOR LENGTHENS LIFE OF RADIO TUBES

TUBE life can be much prolonged with a simple device consisting of an ordinary lamp bulb connected in series with the line cord of the set. The bulb acts as an auxiliary resistor and decreases the current flowing through the tube heaters. The size of the bulb must be determined by experiment. Select one that allows the set to operate at a little under normal volume. A 100-watt bulb works well with most small A.C.-D.C. sets.

Such a tube saver may be used with either A.C. or A.C.-D.C. receivers containing not more than nine vacuum tubes, but not with radios having 82 or 83 mercury-vapor rectifiers, the operating voltage of which should not be tampered with.—H. B. SMITH.


