## The Belmar Broadcasting Show Opens!

Yes! Finally, after two years of planing, a trial display and lots of hard work by a lot of people, the "Return With Us Now, the Sights and Sounds of Early 20th Century Broadcasting" show has opened. On Tuesday, September the 19th, Mayor Linda Morton of Lakewood officially began the show's six month run by reading "the proclamation" and cutting "the ribbon".

Win Ferrill, Belmar's Curator of Exhibits, has organized the exhibit into three areas. First is the main display of the radios that were so generously loaned by the following C.R.C. members;

Leamon Brooks Johnny Johnson Bob Stutzman Daver Wanner Barney Wooters The radios are artfully arranged by age, with appropriate placards, behind protective windows of a 25' long tiered display case. Along the back of the case there are art-deco designs and interesting time-line notations. There are three listening stations, along the front of the display, where you can hear the programs of the various eras through handsets.

The next area contains exhibits of equipment that was used in early radio stations, including a shelf of sound effects items that you are encouraged to try. The equipment comes from KLZ - Denver's first radio station.

The last area is a typical late 1930's living room scenario, complete with period furniture, console radio, floor coverings and even a mother and her infant dressed in clothes of the era. They are listening to the news of the day which you can also hear.


Opening night was particularly special because we coordinated it with the Radio Historical Association of Colorado who used this event to celebrate their 20th anniversary meeting with a production of a live radio drama. Dick and Maletha King, of the RHAC, brought in actual radio actors of the era including Dick Beals (the voice of "Speedy Alkaseltzer"), Hal Stone and The local folks who Sam Edwards. were players included the likes of Pete Smyth, John Rayburn and our own Rick Crandall of KEZW. RHAC members David Gatch and John Licht were also part of the cast.

They produced an episode of the 1935 program "Light on the West", originally sponsored by the Public Service Company, that included sound effects and music. This was a story about the first territorial Governor of Colorado - John Gilpin. As soon as the first of two duplicate presentations was completed, the tape was rushed to the KEZW studios and played over the air.

Elizabeth Nosek, the Curator of Events, has planned monthly programs

to keep the interest in the exhibit at the highest level. These programs, some of which will have audiences and be broadcasted, will include; a trivia contest between Rick Crandall and Dave Smith - the 40's music experts, the KEZW Christmas special, a crystal set class for kids and their parents and radio/TV station tours.

In order to give museum visitors information that they can take away with them, a very informative gallery guide has been produced with high quality pictures and descriptions of all the radios, articles on the history of broadcasting and radios, both in the USA and Denver, and even information on how to generally determine a radio's age -- including a chart of the 1st patent number of every year from 1836 to 1987. The guide is available at the Belmar Village museum gift shop and at regular CRC meetings for \$4.00. Or, you can order it through the mail for \$5.00 post paid. 


The cast as they're performing the "Light On The West" live radio drama





### Interstage Audio Transformer Repair

Even for the novice, 1920's battery sets can be easy to get going, once power supply problems have been solved. A previous article, in the March '95 issue of the Flash, discussed the use of modern batteries for power. Kits or assembled power units are also readily Repair of battery available. consists of checking generally wiring (many times they were tinkered with by a previous owner -- probably to see if he could soup it up to get performance newer like a cleaning contacts and repairing the filament rheostat. By far the most common and troublesome problem with battery sets, in my experience, is the interstage audio transformers. typical five tube tuned rf set, there are two interstage audio transformers: one between the detector and first audio stages, and the other between the first audio and the second audio stages. It's not unusual for one of the two transformers to have an open winding. Most commonly I have found the primary sides which have +B across them to be open, but either the primary or secondary windings are subject to failure. The main failure mechanism seems to be corrosion of the connection of the output leads to the very fine winding wire. How can these be fixed?

Some have advocated zapping the open winding with high voltage (on the order of 100 volts), but my experience with this is limited. I have one transformer that I have successfully repaired this way and it is still working. Others say it is a temporary solution, as

the original cause of the open circuit will continue to work to undo the repair. In any event, if this process fails, then what? It is possible to convert from a transformer coupled resistor-capacitor interstage to a coupled interstage. However, I don't recommend this for two big reasons: originality performance. and Performance will suffer with a RC coupled stage, because the transformer actually provides gain due to step-up effect of the turns ratio. loss of gain can not be tolerated in a battery set because performance is marginal anyway. usually originality reason is self explanatory. The best thing to do is to restore the transformer to operating condition.

If you're lucky, you can find the break in the connection on the outer surface of the winding doughnut -- if that happens to be the winding that has failed. Peel the paper overwrap back and follow the heavier lead wire until you see the splice to the fine winding wire. As I said before, this is often where the problem is. Using typical surgeon skills, which most of us have (not!), reconnect the wires by removing the varnish from the winding wire and re-solder. If this doesn't work, or if the broken connection is on an inner connection, then the winding will have to be replaced. These coils can be rewound, but this is beyond most of us because you are working with 40 AWG wire (finer than human hair!) of at least a mile long. A better way to go is to a replacement winding from buy

Antique Electric Supply. These come with a center tapped secondary so they can be used in a push-pull output stage. For non push-pull operation, just don't use the centar tap The only trouble is that AES's one coil offering is limited to a one-half inch core opening. happens to fit most, but not all, audio transformers. Begin by removing the iron core lanimation pieces of your bad transformer one at a time. Then, with the new coil in place, reverse the It's really easier than you might think, iust little consuming. What do you do if the core lamination stack dimensions won't accept the opening window of the new coil? What works exceedingly well is to use a miniature transformer that can be concealed within the original one. This

requires the center leg of the iron core to be cut out, one slat at a time. This leaves a hole in the center, where the new miniature transformer fits within the old iron core and clam shell covers of the original transformer. This miniature transformer, available only from Gary Schneider at Play Things of Past, has a high permeability core and gives excellent performance for a tiny transformer. It can fit inside most any original transformer, so the repair is invisible from the outside.

Good luck getting those audio transfomers going again! It can be rewarding to repair and play the old battery sets. Some of them actually play quite well.

A friend spotted it and called Johnny; he hurried down to the show to find it,"...it was a miracle, it was still there..." Other in relief radiosets themes similar ones from the Worlds Fair expositions: New York, 1939 and San Francisco 19. There are also identical radiosets from Wards depicting the Lone Ranger and



Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer. Another plastic novelty perched on the shelf is a "soda master" pop dispenser with Pepsi brands soft drink logos on it.

Among the many metal and plastic treasures are the mysterious catalins of many colors. They can be distinguished from plastic cabinet sets by feel; the wall thickness is quite thin on the "tinny" plastic ones. Johnny says catalins get a wonderful glassy finish when they are polished.

Some of the radios on the east wall are mirrored radios, one that catches my eye has a rounded blue mirror face, the Bluebird from 1935. Another one with a glass and framework enclosure is a blue and white house shape that reminds us of stained glass construction. This model is a rare item from the 1933 world's fair known as a Radio Glow. It was sold in other color schemes and glows when illuminated from inside. Johnny bought this one as an empty box; he found the correct chassis for it years later. One curiosity is a GE miniature set made with "beetle" plastic. It looks like grey marble with black accent veins running through it.

It seemed like just days after his release from four years of duty in the Air Force as a B-52 mechanic. Johnny got his start in radio



collecting in a thrift store 25 years ago. The adventure began with buying one Grunow console radio for \$19. Every other day he and his wife would go shopping for radios and had amassed lot of \$3 treasures. By 1975 he had met other collectors and was introduced to the grand scale and caliber of radiosets. He then learned to find good material and began to really spend money on higher quality items he hadn't previously encountered.

Johnny works at his hobby as most of us would also hope to do. His present occupation is collecting, repairing, and dealing in our hobby: radios from the 1930's. It must be more enjoyable

than the electrician work he left behind in 1987. He says he has the best working hours now.

Johnny was one of the original members of Rocky Mountain Wireless club. It lasted through 1987 when it dwindled to less than 10 people meeting at the SWS bank. Even though he was frequently out of town, Johnny kept in

touch with other local collectors. He joined the new CRC at its birth and has attended shows and been a habitual participant at club and collector events. He is puzzled as to why most members of the older club are not part of the new organization.

The collector and antique markets are difficult targets to aim for and Johnny does well enough to get in and out of the traffic. He travels to Chicago every year and to shows locally and to California. Johnny buys enough radios and miscellaneous collectibles to keep busy through the winter. He still goes to flea markets and shows but finds that the pickings are slim compared to years ago, before the 100's of collector books flooded the country. Travelling back east he has run into thousands of buyers and has to compete for what few PAGE: 20

Zeniths he can find. The shows at the Coliseum in October are a good gamble both for selling and



buying. Johnny says that some bakelite and steel radios are not as popular as in the past; the Philco Boomerang must have saturated its market, Johnny still has one. His sales go to all sorts of people just as his purchases come from all sorts of unique hiding places. Most of his current activity is with Zeniths and cathedrals even though, and maybe because, they are getting harder to find.

A visit to one of the work benches: There we find a polished brass, recently plated, ring on a black 1933 Colonial Globe. This radio looks brand new because someone had previously thought to varnish over the delicate gold map design that typically fades away. The ads for this radio say that the ring was gold plated. The brass looks just as good to us. Johnny says the radio is difficult to repair

and so some of them he has found and sold without the radio part working. There is a Zenith chrome part for a front panel that shows the original rust damage through the plating; Johnny is not happy with the result. His repair library has familiar collectors books and volumes of Riders repair manuals as well as some of the original Zenith sales folders 1930's describing and illustrating their product line for the year. Some of his radios visit the repair bench more than once. He would like to fix all of them, and sometimes age keeps creeping up on the radios. A few prizes rarely get played and it is frustrating to have them fail just by sitting on the shelf.

Some of his collecting stories involved travel and encounters with the not-so-ordinary people, who are owners and holders of what we treasure. An unpleasant experience recalled: Johnny went to look at a Stromberg-Carlson with a friend at the radio owner's house and they were face to face with the people who were drunk and thought the radio was worth more than it was, and encountered a live hog, the family pet, before they could escape. From a recent story: Johnny bought a Zenith console from an irate seller that probably didn't know what he had in a quality radio. Even though the

radio chassis was removed from the cabinet Johnny knew he found a desireable set in excellent condition

Johnny is pictured holding one of his current favorite sets, a Peter Pan radio. He has several radios with Peter Pan carved into the grillwork and is always on the lookout for others. He is also fond of his Zenith "The Walton's" model; just like the one seen on the television show. Without a doubt, his favorite radios are Zenith of their sound because performance, the beautiful veneer wood cabinets in mahogany and birds-eye maple, and his customers like the innovative features, like the motorized tuning and squelch that still function. I believe his favorite piece, he is still searching for, is the Zenith Stratosphere, their top of the line: a 25 tube superhet model in a LARGE cabinet with three speakers and 50 watts to drive them! As previously noted by Rick Ammon, Johnny does have the obligatory 1938 Zenith Chairside shutter-dial .. "every collector should have one."
