# The CRC March Meeting at the Museo De Las Americas


As is normally the case, this fine Sunday afternoon found a large contingent of CRC members at our semimonthly meeting. This meeting was a particular treat for us. As you all know, we are privileged to be able to hold our meetings at Denver's Museo De Las Americas adjunct

office spaces. This museum focuses on the art and artifacts of the Spanish speaking peoples of the Americas.

Thanks to arrangements made by CRC member Mike McCutcheon, we were given a docent guided tour of the museum by Shanna Shelby, the museum's Director of Education.



The museum is currently divided into three sections; The first is a



display of ancient artifacts representing the beginnings of the high culture of the Americas. This area is anchored by a huge mural of the ancient city of Tenochtitlán, what is now Mexico City, and a fantastic modern replica of an Indian calendar sun stone carved in rare woods. This carving was created and donated to the museum by Jerry Labbe, a now deceased CRC member.

The next area contains beautiful works of art, mostly of religious icons, that were created by the Spanish who conquered the indigenous peoples of this area.

Finally, the last section contains traveling shows and displays of modern artisans throughout the Americas. Currently, there is a fine display of Argentinean silversmiths.

## **The Moose Springstein Story**

My Radio Collection is varied from 3-Dial TRF's with Horn Speakers to Tombstones and Cathedrals.

But somewhere along the line I turned to collecting Novelty Tube Radios. About 3 years ago I began to search for certain sets. They were already expensive, but hopefully I'd pick up a few before they escalated even higher in price.

I set my sights on the Abbotwares Horse sets. Upon receiving my copy of ARC, I noticed an ad from Virginia, offering an Abbotware with no price. In my past experiences the seller usually wanted even more than the book price, so I didn't respond.

About 2 months later I returned to the ad, and decided to call. "Do you still have the Abbotware Horse?" I asked. The reply was "Yes, But it is a **moose**"! After describing the condition, the guy seemed very sincere, and described *the statue* to be in very nice condition, the set did play.

Bracing myself for a cold bucket of water over the head, I

asked him the price. Surprisingly it was very fair. Upon receiving the set, it was indeed very nice, but it had no rack, or antlers, which left it looking quite plain.

This started the <u>quest</u> to restore this unique radio. I had bought the radio at a low enough price, I could invest more money into it. A couple of *Western Sculpture* artists came into my place of work, and I had an idea.

I took the moose to Manitou Springs, where there is a small foundry that specializes in casting bronze sculptures for the local artists. I had to carefully *finesse* the situation for about **6** months. The wait was worth it!! I am very pleased with the results.

Now that the moose has been restored to his "Regal Splender", he has been dubbed "Moose Springstein".

## TWO INTO ONE

A brief photostory by CRC member David Boyle

Last April a fellow CRC member gave me a pair of American Bosch, Model 28, TRF radios. The idea was to produce one totally


restored radio out of two unrestored ones.

American Bosch, an offshoot of a German firm, was established as American Bosch Magneto Co. in 1919, located in Springfeild, Mass. It became a little complicated during the 1920's as various lawsuits were fought over trademark rights. By 1930 the company was combined between German and American entities and the United American Bosch Corp. was formed.

Bosch started producing radios in 1924. Its first model was the somewhat attractive "Amborola". Approx. 12,000 were made at the wholesale price of \$90.00. Throughout the 1920's a number of models were produced. One of the alluring features of all the sets was their single dial operation.


Some of the "combined" hardware.

Bosch made radios under several names, such as Sonora, Eveready, and Essex. Bosch radios were produced until around 1937. The company lives on as a part of the *United Technologies Corp*.

The Model 28, with 8 tubes: Rectifier, 2 P-P audio, detector, and 4 RF types was introduced in 1928, the second year of manufacturing AC powered sets. It sold for \$132.00 w/o tubes or speaker. The cabinet is solid mahogany with an inlaid lighter wood "pinstripe" on the top and front panels. A photo of the Model 28 is shown in Volume 1 of *Radio Manufactures of the 1920's* on page 36. It is accompanied by a cathedral style speaker cabinet.

#### RADIO WEB SITE REVIEW

The **Antique Radios** home page opens with a random old radio cartoon; you'll get a different cartoon each time you reload the page. There is also Old Time Radio available live (although I couldn't get it to work while writing this - it could be me).

A click on Forum in the top banner will take you to a series of moderated online discussion forums. You may have already been to the news rec.antiques.radio+phono (perhaps a subject for a future review). What distinguishes these forums from that news group is that 1) they are categorized and 2) they are moderated. While the news group can at times have a pretty low signal to noise ratio, these forums offer more focused discussions on topics such as Electrical / Mechanical Restoration, Test Equipment, Cabinet Restoration, and the moderators probably keep out most of the riffraff. These forums appear to have quite a bit of activity too.

For those who prefer live discussions, there are regularly scheduled sessions available every Wed. evening in the **Chat** section.

The **Resources** section offers over 750 links to other radio related sites. These are nicely categorized to facilitate your surfing (e.g. Museums, Radio History, Schematics, OTR).



The **Value Guide** is a work in progress but it currently lists values for nearly 3000 radios, searchable by manufacturer and model number.

The **Photo Gallery** has hundreds of radio and related photos submitted by visitors to the site. These photos are not organized, but you can search the entire site if you are looking for a specific radio.

The **Articles** section has dozens of article reprints, complete with photos, from the 20s to the 40s from *Radio News*, *Radio-Craft*, *Popular Radio* and similar journals. You will see some of these articles featured on the home page.

The **Books** heading takes you to a listing of radio related books with cover photos and brief reviews. This could be handy if you choose to buy a book sight unseen.

Clubs lists radio clubs from all over the world, including our own, and links to them if web sites are available.

The Radio Classified list claims to be "The Largest Listing of Free Radio Ads on the Web!". You can browse through the ads by category (including TVs, Military, Wire recorders, Test equipment, Tubes, Paper, Free items!, etc.), or search for specific keywords.

And finally, **Free Email** lets you sign up for a free email account on the site, presumably of the form, your name@antiqueradios.com.



# **Weekend Rejuvination**

-an Arvin 450T

With ever demanding work schedules and even longer work hours, a major radio restoration may be out of the question right now for a lot of us. However, a simple two-day weekend project can be very rewarding and fulfilling.

This particular Arvin Model 450T was obtained from an on-line auction for a low, very reasonable bid (unusual!!). The condition of the radio was described as; "Dark Brown bakelite case with no cracks or chips, needs cleaning. Does not play".

Arvin Models 450T and 451T used the same chassis. The 451 cabinet had additional trim and deluxe knobs and was available in Ivory, Willow Green, Sandalwood, and Ebony. The 450 cabinet was available in only Ivory or Walnut. Dimensions are approx. 11 inches long by 61/4 high by 51/2 inches in depth. An AC-DC set, it receives only the Broadcast Band, and uses the following 7-pin miniature 12BE6 Mixer-oscillator. tubes: 12BA6 IF Amp, 12AT6 DET-AVC AF Amp, 50C5 Output and a 35W4 Rectifier.

#### Day One

Disassembly was the first task to be fulfilled. The chassis was removed and the cabinet gingerly set aside for later. The tubes were removed from the chassis and tested, they all tested good. A thorough cleaning of the chassis with Brasso metal polish followed by a complete visual inspection underneath the chassis revealed no obvious shorts, damaged or failed components. With the tubes reinserted in their proper locations, the chassis was plugged into an isolation transformer and cautiously turned on. Several moments later there was a loud hum from the speaker, probably bad filter capacitors. The set was unplugged while a schematic was sought out.

Returning armed with a Rider's schematic, the filter capacitors were located underneath the chassis. Being a 3-section unit, it would be replaced with three separate capacitors, one 40uf and two 20uf, all three are 150V capacitors, with a common ground. The schematic made hooking up the capacitors to the proper wires

quite simple. The Volume Control / On-Off switch was cleaned with *Tuner Cleaner & Lubricant* and a new #47 Dial light installed. The set was repowered up, and after a little warm-up time, it came to life, and it sounded really good. The set was left to play continuously for about three hours nonstop with no signs of signal or volume fading. Pleased with the results, the set was turned off for the evening.

#### Day Two

The next task was to clean the bakelite cabinet, which exhibited a dull, dirty looking haze. This would involve three different steps and lots of work.

The first step was to clean the cabinet with paint thinner and a soft rag with elbow grease to remove the top layer of dirt and grime. This was repeated two more times, and then left to dry for about 15 minutes.


The second step involved deep-cleaning the case. Fellow CRC member, Merril Campbell, has shown us his excellent results using *Brasso* as a cleaner on bakelite. There are numerous other cleaners that work equally as well. Whatever used is one's own personal preference, however be careful not to use abrasives. The cleaner was liberally applied to the case and allowed to sit a few

minutes. Then the cleaner was wiped off with a very soft paper towel (Kleenex brand works well). Toothpicks, Q-Tips, and toothbrushes work well for cleaning grooves, edges and louvers. This step was repeated four times on this cabinet, with noticeable improvement each time.


The final step definitely is worth the extra effort it involves. A thin layer of Kiwi Neutral Shoe Polish is applied to a three inch square section of the cabinet. The polish is then melted into the surface of the case using hand-held hair dryer. Using a clean, soft rag or towel, the section is hand-buffed until all the polish is removed and the section shines. Another section was worked on entire cabinet until the was finished. A second coat of polish applied. The results were incredible, the cabinet looked like new.

The chassis was carefully installed into the *new* cabinet, and the knobs were installed. The finished radio was proudly put on display. It had turned out to be a fun, simple, quick and rewarding project.
