Meet the Collector - Mike Cook

This issue of "Meet the collector" was suppose to feature Rich Kuberski however time got away from both of us and so as not to miss a deadline, I will feature myself - Mike Cook. Look for Rich in Feb 2008.



I've been a member of the CRC since 2001 and have been involved / interested in Radio collecting since the 70's. I grew up in a central Missouri rural farm community and often went to farm sales and auctions with my grandfather, a wheeler dealer from the get go, who generally bought items for resell in his country store. I was bitten by the radio bug when I went to one of these auctions and ended up with a Radiola 18 and Pierless speaker. The Radiola was in really bad shape, the mahogany case was painted yellow and the chassis was missing several tubes, but I couldn't complain - no one wanted it so I got it for 25 cents. It took me a while to find the tubes but when I finally powered it up, it sounded pretty good (I didn't know about a variac then).

From then until now, my collection has increased a little. I scour the local antique malls and flea markets and occasionally find a real jewel - A Regency TR-1 and Zenith 520-URR are recent examples. I suppose my favorite Radio's are the old cathedrals since they quintessentially represent the Golden age of Radio - nothing better than old radio tuned to a Benny Goodman tune. I also

have an extensive collection (almost all) of Zenith Transoceanics as well as a fairly nice collection of early tubes.

In my earlier collecting days I use to think that every wood cabinet needed a complete refinish, however I've recently changed my way of thinking that the dings and dents add character to the set and are evidence of the years of use - they tell a story. I still clean them up as best I can and often seek help with the electronics - perhaps I'm getting lazy but I suspect at some point an un-restored radio will be more valuable than those that are restored.



My favorite radio is always the one I just finished - so today it's a Zenith 12S370. What a project! It started with a cabinet that a fellow collector gave me which was in poor condition - missing parts, dry rot and water stains on the top to name a few. It had no chassis, dial bezel or speaker - I nearly gave up on it several times and even sat it out for the trash one morning but just couldn't let it go. So it took me a year to locate all the parts and get the cabinet to an acceptable condition. Now, it is complete and in wonderful playing condition - you may even see it at our next show.

I am employed as a project manager director for one of the local telecom companies and as for other interest, I generally like woodworking and building small projects for friends and family - I just got a lathe so all my wood stock is now round...

Restoration of a 04BR-730A Airline Console

Last summer, a neighbor down the street from us called and wanted me to look at a radio that his son had acquired. I went and quickly looked at the radio, which was in the back of his dimly lit garage. It was a 1940 Montgomery Wards Airline Console Model # 04BR-730A. A quick inspection revealed the radio needed a replacement knob, grille cloth, and the top part of the cabinet would have to be refinished. It also didn't play, it just bellowed garbled noise. I didn't need another project, but his son was very excited about the radio, and he offered to pay me. I agreed to restore the set, but I warned him that it would take me quit a while to complete the radio.

The next afternoon the radio was delivered to my garage. It was at that time that I realized how bad of shape the cabinet was in. The bottom support pieces, or "shoes", that are the actual bottom part of the cabinet were missing. I had completely overlooked that. The top dome section of the cabinet did have a very nasty crack across the front of it, which I had noticed before but didn't realize how bad it was until I closely examined it. What was left of the cabinet was very flimsy and structurally unsound. It did appear that the radio had been dropped, or possibly fallen off the back of a truck, and landed very hard. There were two support pieces inside the set that were supposed to hold a wire antenna, which was also missing. I did find a picture of it on the Internet. I'd really gotten my self into a real pickle.

The radio chassis and speaker were removed from the cabinet and set aside. I had decided to take on the cabinet first. It was re-glued and clamped in several places, with new support blocks being added, and straightened out as I went. Using a syringe filled with wood glue, the crack across the upper dome part of the cabinet was slowly glued and clamped about one inch at a time, until the crack was repaired. After locating

some pictures of the set, new bottom support pads, or "shoes", were cut from some scrap pieces of oak and shaped with a router. They were attached to previously added new supports and later colored with walnut toner lacquer. The bottom portion of the cabinet appeared to be a photo-paper type of finish. For that reason the bottom portion of the cabinet was left "as is", but it was taped off to protect it while the top part of the cabinet was stripped and refinished with new stains and toner lacquers, which helped to cover the repaired crack. The entire cabinet was then coated with several coats of clear lacquer. New control indicator decals, which had been

alignment information was located in Volume 12 of Rider's Perpetual Trouble Shooter's Manual. The switches and controls were tested and cleaned. The tone control was faulty (open) and was replaced. The filter capacitors were replaced, along with several other capacitors which were replaced beneath the chassis. The push-button control assembly was thoroughly cleaned and lightly lubricated. A new power cord was soldered in place, and the set was powered up. An outside long wire antenna was attached to the set with poor results. A good earth ground was added, and the set did pick up some stations, but the results were still mediocre at best.



previously ordered, were applied and a new grille cloth was installed. After several weeks, the cabinet was finally completed.

Next was the radio chassis, which used the following tubes; 6SA7, 6SK7, 6SQ7, 6J5GT, 2 - 6K6GT's, and a 5Y3GT. All the tubes were tested, and checked out okay, except for both 6K6GT's which were bad and were replaced. Next, a schematic and

The schematic showed the missing antenna to be part of the tuned circuit for the radio. Referring to the article "Tuned Circuit Primer" by David Boyle, CRC member, which was in the March, April 2006 issue of the Flash, I decided to experiment. I found an old ferrite core antenna with one large coil with one small coil and four lead wires, which matched the physical characteristics shown on the schematic. Its origin was unknown. Different lead wire hookups were tried at the antenna plug on the back of the chassis, and I was lucky enough to find one wiring arrangement that did work with about six feet of wire hooked to the antenna jack, and no ground wire. The ferrite core antenna was attached to the side of the chassis using a bracket already on the antenna core. The set was alternately realigned and the selectivity adjustment tuned several times until satisfactory reception was achieved. I was very, very relieved!

The chassis was placed back inside the refinished cabinet and the 6 ft. length of antenna wire was stapled around the inside of the cabinet. The knobs were pressed onto their respective controls, along with a replacement knob that had been poured and painted earlier. The radio played perfectly, tuning stations all

along the dial without an external antenna. After months of work, the set was completed.

In the May/June 2006 issue of the Flash, CRC member Larry Synder wrote a article titled "Restoration of a 1936 Admiral B125". In his article, he told us how he used a spreadsheet file to track the values of components he tested and what he replaced. As this was my first "paid" restoration project, I tracked all the measured values and expenses in a similar spreadsheet to see how I faired. As we had agreed on a preset price (probably not the smartest thing), with everything figured in I just barely made a couple of dollars. I guess I'd better keep my day job! I did have that satisfaction of finishing the restoration, and knowing that the radio played very well, and looked almost brand new.

After this project was competed, I did discover that Antique Electronic Supply does have antenna coils. One is wire wound around the perimeter of a hardboard backing piece, resembling the back for a table radio. The others are wound on ferrite rods. These could be used for a similar restoration project.
